Secretary's report

Next year's enrolments opening first week of Dec



The Committee at its September meeting started planning for 2022 including reviewing continuing and new activities, confirming the availability of venues and facilities, and

considering health requirements and messaging. More work is underway in preparing for next year particularly given the complex external environment. Through regular Newsflashes we will keep you posted of further activities for this year and the timetable for 2022. At this stage we are planning to open enrolments for 2022 in the first week of December.

Collaboration with other U3As

Our Club has received tremendous feedback from the U3A Network about the success of U3A Hobsons Bay/Williamstown in re-energising the club with an interesting and diverse range of classes and one -off activities, a convenor engagement strategy and Committee succession planning.

We are one of a very few U3As that have been able to grow membership during the pandemic with a 31% growth from 2020 to 2021. 37% of members are new this year (see chart).

The word has got around and the Committee has been invited to make presentations at the Network AGM and at U3A Dandenong AGM. Dandenong is a club of similar size to HBW and there is interest in collaborating over a range of activities and organisational items.

Current Affairs

What an incredible time to be discussing current affairs with a global pandemic, shifts in the engagement of nations (like the withdrawal from Afghanistan) and now the new AUKUS alliance.

There's been some great sessions in our Current Affairs group led by various members including a session on Tasmanian salmon farming, imagery in the media, slugs on the floor – controversy at the Dandenong Council, China and a session titled Our Children Their Future.



Topics covered included the ANZUS alliance, stand-off between Beijing and Canberra, and Australia's "laggard state" reputation in international climate change forums

Marianne Lessels loves all things Indonesian

My husband Lance and I each (independently) backpacked in Indonesia in the 70s and have been involved in/following Indonesian interests since then. We've travelled there frequently and from 2006-2016 went annually to Surakarta (Central Java) as volunteers in the English language program at an Islamic Junior High School.

These days I have a weekly 2 hour conversation lesson (in Indonesian) with a teacher who lives in Java, belong to an Indonesian book group, and regularly go to/zoom talks, lectures, discussions on anything to do with Indonesia, especially music events.

Gamelan

I've played gamelan since 1993. The term gamelan refers to the entire set of instruments as well as to the music played on them or the group who plays them. We play Central Javanese style gamelan (from Yogyakarta and Surakarta) which is associated with the cultural traditions of the royal courts. The music is played in formal ceremonies, as popular entertainment and for important occasions such as weddings.

There are about 12 players in our group and we play on the set at the University of Melbourne. There aren't many sets in Melbourne as they're expensive and take up a lot of space. Players sit cross-legged on the floor to play (as we get older we're using small stools).

It's percussive music. We use beaters and play different rhythms and melodies that all come together/interlock. We learn how to play all the instruments which helps us understand how it works.

Our teacher, who sadly passed away last year, came from Java and was passionate and enthusiastic about his culture. He drummed, played, danced, sang, was a puppeteer and taught almost all gamelan players in Melbourne.



We perform with dancers and singers and do Wayang Kulit (shadow puppet shows). In Java they go all night but we play for 2-3 hours to suit local audiences and

ourselves!

We've played at Indonesian events, Multicultural Arts events, schools, weddings, gallery openings... and they're nearly always accompanied by delicious Indonesian food. Weekly rehearsals are great fun as most of us have been together since early days. We're now waiting to see when we'll be allowed back into the uni building to play.

Why do I play? I just love the music, the culture, the atmosphere, performing, the connections.

Marianne is an active member of U3A – and currently participates in Explore Writing, Friday Cryptic Crossword Group, Thursday Book Group, Arts Happening and Explore Melbourne Walks.
