However, there may be a time when you need to contact someone with a more specific query. Here are functions led by Committee members with assistance from members of our club.





#### **GRANTS**

Thanks to Hobsons Bay Council we have received a grant of \$2,500 to support our art activities.



The project encourages seniors to re-engage post-pandemic through social interaction and

learning new skills, culminating in an art and photographic exhibition of their work in December. The exhibition will include over 30 exhibits covering drawing, painting in multiple mediums and photos. The theme is Never too old to start. The Williamstown Library Exhibition space has been made available for two weeks, with gala opening inviting Councillors, local dignitaries, and organisations like Hobsons Bay Art Society.

The recent cold weather has been a test on how well our venues cope with the elements. By all accounts our new temporary home at Digman Reserve is very warm and cosy and the Senior Citizens Centre is good, provided the heater is turned on early enough.

We are currently looking at various options to make the Cottage a bit more comfortable. There are two reliable heaters there, but they need to be turned on early to get the rooms warm.

An update on the redevelopment of the Williamstown Senior Citizens Centre: the start date has been extended due to sourcing building materials and suitable trades people. The council is now looking at work starting at the end of September, and the build will take approximately 18 months.

# **Evaluation Working Group**



We have set up an evaluation working group, led by Committee member **Sandy Guest** (who has a lot of experience in evaluation and audit processes), assisted by members Sandi Fallshaw, Kerry Lewis, Phil Quinn and Michael Wagner.

#### Why do we need an evaluation process.

#### Our mission states:

U3A Hobsons Bay/Williamstown Inc. supports positive ageing by meeting the needs of the retired and semiretired members of its community for social interaction and learning opportunities.

The evaluation process will measure whether we are fulfilling our mission. Are we on track? Are there things we can do better?

#### How will we do this?

All members will have the opportunity to participate in the process. A range of tools will be used including: surveys, a SWOT analysis (strength, weaknesses, opportunities and threats) to be conducted with Convenors at their upcoming workshop, and the completion of a number of Success Stories (personal interviews) with members.

All information collected will be based on the stated goals in the Action Plan, which can be viewed on our website.

#### How will the evaluation be used?

It will be used to communicate to our members and key external partners the positive changes/benefits U3A Hobson's Bay /Williamstown offers to its members.

As well we will embed the process of continuous improvement as a key part of the management of the organisation

Information about timelines and specific evaluation activities will be communicated to all members via the regular Communication Channels.




there were a few looking towards retirement and are starting to check out what is available once they have more leisure time.

# **Playing with Words**

The U3A Hobsons Bay/Williamstown Cryptic Crossword group's presentation at the Williamstown Literary Festival was a great success.

The interactive workshop was led by Tony McCosker and Darby Higgs with the assistance of Marianne Lessels.

Fourteen people enrolled in the workshop, and we were delighted that they were all enthusiastic about crosswords. Some had tackled cryptic clues in the past; others were very new to the game.

To begin with, I outlined a bit of "crossword theory" and some fundamentals in approaching crosswords. We then moved onto the fun bit – how to unravel clues.



To assist people with unravelling a clue, I proposed a three-stage process with each clue:

- 1. identifying the word at the *beginning* or *the end of the clue* that could provide us with the "answer";
- 2. identifying the word/or words in the clue that direct us too how to solve the clue that, is identifying the *type* of clue:
- 3. pulling the clue apart and reassembling the bits to arrive at the solution.

We then did a practice run through each of the types of clues – anagrams, embedded clues, double definitions, combination (pancake) clues, equivalent expressions, etc.

It was great to hear an "ah" as the penny dropped – a moment of enlightenment and excitement when the solution to the clue seemed to magically appear! Ah, there it is – it was there looking at me all the time!

Darby Higgs then took over the facilitation of the activity as we jointly attacked a medium degree of difficulty crossword. Working in pairs, the various types of clues were identified, and it was not long before solutions to clues were jumping off the page.

To conclude the workshop, participants (neophyte cruciverbalists) were each presented with a copy of Phil Quinn's publication Solving Cryptic Crosswords, which provides further clues on how to solve the riddles that are cryptic crossword clues. (Available on our website under "Resources").
