
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Vice-President's welcome

Online Enrolments a hit

What an incredible response to the 2023 offerings. Members have been busy enrolling online with over 200 members enrolling in just over a week. By 10.30 on the first day of enrolments Philosophy was full and now over one third of



Christine Crofton – a proud maker of quilts for Aussie Heroes



Aussie Hero Quilts is an organisation started by Australian, Jan Maree Ball, after she heard about an injured Australian defence member who was transferred to a hospital in Germany. He was given a quilt by an American group and she said she felt ashamed there was

not an Aussie quilt for him.

Ten years of sewing by volunteers has seen 15, 000 quilts and 34,000 laundry bags sent off to military personnel deployed overseas in many roles including

combat, peace keeping, coastal surveillance, as well as those on various duties at home in Australia.

I became involved five years ago when I nervously made my first quilt. Since then, I have made about 30 quilts of various designs to fit in with requests, plus I



have made quilts of valour (fallen hero quilt) which are special quilts with poppy designs in red, green and black, made for families of military personnel who have been killed or died.

This year I went to Canberra for the 10th anniversary dinner to commemorate Aussie Hero Quilts. Those AHQ volunteers who were able to attend plus military personnel, veterans, partners and friends all mixed and shared stories at the dinner. The quilters shared tips and tricks with each other, chatting about the different requests and the anxiety to do "the perfect job"

We all realised an item finished as best we can and made with love and pride is better than not finished at all!

The constant theme was one of gratitude and thanks for making quilts for the troops. Recipients are always emotional as they find it hard to believe that people who do not know them care.

The stories we heard were heart wrenching. One dad spoke about receiving a fallen hero's quilt and how that special quilt helps the family through difficult times. Today they still wrap themselves in it and reflect on their son's life and the sacrifice given to enable freedom in our country.

Another was a retired Major who is now an artist and suffers from PTSD (a late diagnosis) and how receiving a quilt one day changed his life. He had planned to take his life the evening of the day the quilt arrived. He opened it and realised people cared and it changed the direction of his life. He was accompanied by his assistance dog Squish a British bulldog.

We attended a presentation to those who had recently had quilts made for them and were stationed in Canberra. I had the pleasure of presenting the last two quilts I had made. The first was to Kevin who is in the Army in the Armoured Corp. He was very shy and overcome but so grateful, especially when he realised I had used the unit colours on the back of the quilt.

Navy. Her request was pink and bright with her initials. She raced up and hugged me and was delighted with the quilt. Her commanding



officer said it matched her bubbly bright personality.

Margaret Dugdale and her book *Hamish* and the Double Bass

The writing of *Hamish* and the *Double Bass*, which I started four years ago has been an absolute joy. The story takes the listener and the reader on an adventure. A small boy, Hamish, who loves going to concerts with his Grandma, by chance meets the lonely Double Bass, a big instrument that Hamish is way too small to play. With a little bit of magical encouragement from the

Double Bass Hamish goes off with his friends to learn to play the smaller instruments of the orchestra. All the children have fun practising their instruments, and not wanting to miss out of being part of the story, have made up whimsical rhymes about themselves. One day,



on realising how tall he has grown Hamish races back to the city to find the Double Bass. Together, with great excitement they head off to play with all their friends in the biggest orchestra of all.

Most children's first experience of learning to play is through the instruments of the orchestra. The book provides these children, and others who may simply enjoy listening and watching with a positive contemporary story about the orchestra: the excitement and the adventure of going to a concert, the moment of anticipation before the music begins, the imagined places music can take them to and the possibility of growing up to play in an orchestra and the joy of making music with friends.

With its beautiful illustrations by **Becky Stout of Rock Sheep Studio** the book is full of energy, warmth and movement and will delight children between the ages of

3 to 8 years. It gives a new and contemporary perspective on the orchestra and perhaps more importantly, of making music together. With its appropriate culturally diverse characters the book will appeal to


Keep up-to-date with Network news
