## Acting President

- Development of sub committees, this has spread the load and tapped into the skills and experience of members.
- Increase in membership numbers, convenors, and activities.
- Future challenges will be to ensure sufficient venues to support a range of activities, and the growth in numbers of members and their suggestions.

## Vice President

- Regional meetings have provided a connection to the Vic network office and further resources.
- U3A Williamstown is considered a leader in the region.
- Repairs, maintenance, and updates continue in all venues.

## Secretary

2023 AGM minutes accepted. 2023 Monthly committee meetings held x 11 with 9 committee members.

- Membership has continued to grow with a 10% increase and now stands at 346 as of March 2024
- Full 240, Associate 25, life 4.
- Convenors now number 56

## Treasurer

- No fee increases for this year.
- Budget set for 2024 includes increase for cleaning and internet.

## Subcommittees.

### Activities & Member support

- Program continues to grow with another 12 activities added to the 50 offered in 2023.
- Frequency and duration of activities will continue to vary from one-off to whole year and all things in between.
- Will continue to look out for new suggestions.
- Encouragement of members who have a skill or interest not currently convening to put themselves forward.
- December through to February activity is higher.
- Currently seeking another member to join this committee.
- Major activity is around enrolment and how to join activities.

### Convenor Support

- Acknowledgement of the generosity of all those who offered to be convenors and co convenors which has enabled us to meet demand.
- There are 11 new convenors and 13 convenors who are covering multiple activities.
- Convenors Workshops in June and November were very successful, and feedback would indicate that similar events be held regularly.

### Management System

- Thank you to Kevin Whelan who has generously helped us navigate UMAS.
- Lars has taken over the management of the web and has done an excellent job of updating and refining the items for members to view.
- This small group is now part of the newly established Communication subcommittee.


## NEW MEMBERS

- On the web site under the membership tab there is a welcome to new members letter with some very detailed information, which may be useful to print and keep handy.
- We have three main methods of communication. **Newsflashes** - go out the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> Wed of each month which is a short update. **Newsletter** - goes out at the end of each term this is a roundup of activities, celebrations, and special successes. **Facebook** – which is a closed group a way of staying in touch and sharing comments and photos.
- On the web site under the activities tab is the calendar for the year. This can be viewed in calendar or list view. Clicking on an activity will display detailed information regarding the activity including availability and wait list status. Filters can be applied to find information quickly i.e. specific month, day, ongoing, new etc.

# SCAMMING WORKSHOP



This workshop ran on Tuesday 12<sup>th</sup> March and will be repeated in April. It filled quickly and demonstrated just what interest and concern there is in this topic. As many were unable to join this activity here is a summary of the two-hour session.

Presented by the **Australian Consumer and Competitive Commission (ACCC)**.

The workshop covered topics such as.

- Scam statistics.
- What a scam is
- Common scam terminology
- Types of scams
- Ways to spot a scam.
- Help and support should you be a victim of a scam.

In July 2023 the government launched the National Anti-Scam Centre **SCAMWATCH** to bring together experts to make Australia a harder target.

The aim of the service is to

1. Help people spot a scam and give advice.
2. Collect and share information across government and industries.
3. Coordinate action to combat scams.

**SCAM** - when someone deceives you **to steal money or personal information**. It is **not** computer hacking, unfair contracts, or harassing marketing approaches.



## Top Scams you should know about

1. Impersonation scams (think bank, government)
2. Investment scams
3. Romance Scams
4. Jobs and employment
5. Product and services (think fake web sites fake ads, stolen logos)- Hard to spot.

The statistics are truly startling.

In 2023

- 301.791 reports of scams to scam watch.
- Over 65's hold the top spot and have lost the most.
- Victoria has the highest loss in the country at \$110 million.

Last week an Australian Financial Review article reported that 3500 websites had been shut done in a week.

The over 55's accounted for

- \$221.7 million in losses
- 38% of all reports to scamwatch
- 46% of all losses
- \$18million to romance scams.
- \$151 million to investment scams
- An increase in number of people losing money via social media.



So, what can you do? The next page outlines some things to think about and where to get help if necessary.

# WHAT CAN I DO?

## STAYING SAFE



Stay safe by:

- Not sharing personal information or passwords
- It sounds too good to be true it probably is.
- Do not answer unknown numbers let them go to message bank.
- Check your bank account daily.
- Do not click on links go to the web site from your browser.

(I nearly got caught with this from a courier company it wasn't until I went to the company web site via google and put in the tracking number, I realised it was a scam as the number didn't exist and the message was from a fake site.)

- Use the number on the back of your Card to contact the bank.



## THREE RULES

**STOP.** Don't rush to act or agree to anything.

**THINK.** Do you really know who you are speaking to. If you're not sure hang up.

**PROTECT.** Act quickly to report it.

**Being a scam victim can be overwhelming, but it can happen to anyone, and support is available.**


### SOLO


# Book Group #1


## Desert Island Discs
